490. Independent Study

Fall, Spring. 1 to 6 credits. A student may earn a maximum of 9 credits in all enrollments for this course.

R: Approval of department.

Special projects arranged by an individual student and a faculty member in areas supplementing regular course offerings.

491. Special Topics in Russian Studies
